I navigate to @fat\_and\_fabulous's account and see this bio:

FAT and FABULOUS!

Fight Diet Culture 
Fat Activist, Revolutionary,
and All Around Badass!

There are no pictures of the owner, but it's clearly a "her" (an old knitting post precedes a recent spate of Fat Activist screeds). I click on the comments section of her last rant and see, "Comments on this post have been limited." In other words, I can't comment on her posts, but she can comment on mine. I'm sure it's easier to be an "All Around Badass!" when you don't have to face criticism.

I navigate back to my page and reply, I agree that not everyone who is fat wants to lose weight. Those people should ignore my fat-loss posts and take advantage of my exercise and nutrition tips. My account is for anyone who wants to be healthier.

@fat\_and\_fabulous fires back, Your account and your appearances on shows like Morning Cup of Jo are contributing to the culture of body shaming.

I respond, How?

By implying that thin is good and fat is bad.

Being significantly overweight IS bad for your HEALTH. It does not make YOU bad, I type. I hesitate before posting because of the all caps. Usually, I try to stay away from them, unless it's the word "AMAZING," which I have a weakness for. After a moment of deliberation, I decide *fuck it* and press Post.

For the rest of the afternoon, I turn over what @fat\_and\_fabulous wrote. The uncomfortableness it triggered in me. Is my account a form of body shaming? I don't think so. It's well established that being overweight is bad for one's health. Not that long ago, the smoking industry denied the health risks of its product. And look how that turned out.

Am I upset because @fat\_and\_fabulous doesn't like me? Not a chance. I'd have been out of this game years ago if I needed everyone to like me.

Nevertheless, our exchange niggles at me as I prepare for my weekly check-in with Kylie. I review my notes and am reminded of the weather wheel in my second-grade classroom. Each day, a different student would look out the window and set the dial to the day's weather. Stormy, sunny, windy, snowy, cloudy, or rainy. What will Kylie's mood be like today, I wonder.

At five p.m., bang on, my phone rings.

"Hi, Kylie."

"I tried to call you, like, three times," she informs me as the storm clouds roll in.

"Yes, I saw that. I was reviewing my notes so I could be fully prepared for our time together. How's everything going?" Inwardly, I cringe and await the onslaught.

"Awful. I weigh a hundred and forty-three pounds. That's more than when I started. Once you abandoned me, I ate all the ice cream. And then it really spiraled out of control. I've eaten pizza, a tube of cookie dough, and three donuts at work. I don't even like donuts that much, but they were there, so I ate them. Now I'm fat and everyone hates me. I hate myself. It's all your fault. You're the worst coach ever. I wish Bianca was here." Sobs strangle her voice.

"Oh, Kylie, I'm sorry. I miss her too."

"No, you don't. You're happy she's gone. You get her clients and have a better chance of winning the Olympia . . . Well, maybe not you." My molars grind. *Two years ago I took second!* "I mean, let's face it. You're no Bianca. I saw your earlier pictures. And you weren't just fat. You were, like, morbidly obese. Underneath your veneer, you're more fucked-up than I am."

I'm speechless. She didn't just call me obese—a word I can't stand, a word that makes my breath shallow—she called me morbidly obese, a term I pretend doesn't exist.

And she's right.

I remember the first time a doctor told me that my weight put me in the morbidly obese category. I simply nodded, like I understood what that meant. As soon as I got home, I googled it. "Morbid obesity" is defined as being more than one hundred pounds overweight, or having a BMI of forty or greater. Then I looked up the word "morbid," which means unhealthy or

diseased. In other words, I was so fat that I was diseased. No wonder the whole world was revolted by me.

Even though I know I was those two words put together, I like to pretend that Fat Gemma was someone I used to know, like a high school acquaintance, or a former coworker from a long-forgotten job. Someone I've outgrown. But that's not true.

She is me.

Suddenly, it's clear why @fat\_and\_fabulous got under my skin: She is my former fat girl. Out of her cage.

The hand holding my phone starts to sweat and tremble.

Kylie continues, "So maybe you're not the right coach for me after all." She hangs up.

I feel like I'm on a stage set, somewhere in the middle of the second act. And Fat Gemma, from the long-forgotten first act? Turns out she's been lurking backstage the whole time. Waiting to return.

And she's really fucking hungry.

Steve's at work and won't be back for hours. I could order a whole pizza and eat it all. My mouth starts to water at the thought, my nostrils recalling the heavenly smell of oregano. Deep dish pizza was one of my favorite foods, back when I was fat. Bready, gooey, Chicago-style, with extra cheese and sauce. I would order a large and promise myself that I would only have one piece, maybe two. Knowing, even as I placed the order, that I was lying to myself. I'd order a six pack of ice-cold Coca-Cola to go with it, the crisp carbonation the perfect foil to the thick, heavy pizza.

I'm begging Fat Gemma not to order it. As soon as the order is placed, it's all over. I remember telling Kylie how binging on ice cream wasn't a terrifying situation and feel like a hypocrite. He pulls a stack of fabric samples out of a black Bottega Veneta messenger bag and begins to lay them on our table in a neat grid. There are five colors: Red Flame, Orange Glow, White Hot, Smokin' Smoke, Banging Black. Each is available in multiple fabric options, everything from lightweight and shiny to heavy and matte.

While he's busy ensuring all the swatches are evenly spaced and their edges parallel, I look around. And spot Detective Cooper in the corner. The air drops out of my lungs.

"Did you see the detective?" I whisper.

"Of course. I see everything." Craig waves his hand dismissively, keeps his focus on adjusting the samples.

Is Cooper here for me or for Craig? For us both? I haven't heard from him since he left my home with Bianca's bag yesterday. With a shaky hand, I take a sip of water.

I like @queen\_kylie's comment and navigate to her page. She's an average-looking girl who wears too much makeup and takes too many selfies. She has photos of herself sticking out her tongue at Starbucks, making duck-lips at restaurants, and checking out her abs in bathroom mirrors. The captions are mostly forgettable things like, Monday morning! and Date night! However, every now and then, there will be a rant, such as a recent one directed at the Costco in Tampa. In it, she discusses, with limited punctuation, the incompetence of the staff, the harsh store lighting, the poor store layout, and their shitty return policy. Beneath it, @hedgefundguy11 has the first comment, Whoever wrote this is a COWARD! And a fat, ugly bitch.

Light encroaches at the edge of my vision. Black spots dance before me. I realize that I'm not breathing. I've forgotten how. I force a shallow inhale. Squeeze it through a crack in my stopped-up throat.

Then all at once, the dam breaks, and my breath comes crashing in, fast and furious. I lean over and plant my hands on the table. My breath washes over me. Through me. I surrender to it until it finally slows, and I sink into a chair. Rest my head in my hands.

I cannot afford this. This account took me years to build. Thousands of hours have been invested. With shaking fingers, I attempt to google, *what to do if your Instagram account is hacked*, but my sweaty fingers slide all over my phone. Just when I think it can't get worse, a client's text buzzes, "Hey, I think your email's been hacked." Shit, I never got around to updating my email to use multi-factor authentication.

I'm splurging on the most badass security system around. Every window. Every door. Motion sensors, video cameras, the works. If whoever is coming in my home tries it again, I'm going to catch him dead to rights. Lock him up. I'm almost looking forward to it.

## **ASHLEY**

I'm scanning A New You's networks and systems, looking for a vulnerability. And questioning my sanity.

Instead, he's sitting solitary on the sofa in his boxer shorts playing video games. Oblivious that his wife is spying on him. That she's pregnant. That

his life's about to blow up.

Confirming that home and hotel room are secure, I finally relax.

I flip on the television. *Dish with Debbie* is due to start in a few minutes, and I've been looking forward to this episode. Debbie is scheduled to interview Craig, who's in town as one of the Olympia sponsors.

I settle into bed as Craig is welcomed to the stage. His gait is loose and confident, his smile warm and friendly.

Debbie starts out by lobbing him a softy. "My, Craig, you've been busy! In the last few years, REIGN has taken the nation by storm. Can you tell us a bit about how you arrived at where you are today?"

Craig discusses how he started REIGN six years ago as a side gig while he was working in IT. He had recently switched to a vegan diet and was concerned that he wasn't getting enough protein. He started researching vegan protein powders and was disappointed in the options available. Many of them tasted horrible, contained cheap fillers, or both. Because he couldn't find what he wanted, he decided to produce it himself. And a business was born.

Now look at me. I have drawers full of workout clothes in every color under the sun. I'm paid to model gym attire by a company that would never have sold to the likes of me five years ago. Craig makes some good points. He does have a small company. It would be a risk. It's his business on the line, not mine. I tell myself all of this. Yet, as I sit here in my Bombshells Only REIGN attire, I can't help but feel a bit ashamed.

The owner, Craig, seems okay at first. But once Debbie starts grilling him about his refusal to make larger sizes, his arrogance becomes apparent. He keeps using the phrase "standard size" for the women he designs his apparel for. At one point, Debbie asks her producer to pull up dictionary.com and find the definition for "standard." Turns out it's something that is "regarded as the usual or most common size or form of its kind." @living\_my\_best\_life\_94: It's his company. He can run it any way he wishes. If you don't like it, why don't you create your own company and, you know, do all the hard work and take on all the risk that comes with that?

I delete @living\_my\_best\_life\_94's comment.

**@Lydia\_Fed\_Up:** Stand up against oppression! Fight fat discrimination!

@living\_my\_best\_life\_94 responds to @Lydia\_Fed\_Up: This isn't oppression. A company can choose whom they wish to cater to. And this isn't discrimination. Fat is not an intrinsic characteristic, like skin color or sex. It's a result of life choices, like lung cancer can be a result of smoking.

I delete this comment and block @living\_my\_best\_life\_94 from my account.

@Lydia\_Fed\_Up: So @fat\_and\_fabulous, what are you going to do? Ball's in your court . . .

It's like an electric jolt. What *am* I going to do? Just complain and wring my hands? Or am I going to act?

As I'm mulling next steps, a post from Gemma, REIGN promotor, Diet Culture enabler, pops up on my feed. She's squawking about some Olympia contest she's going to be in.

But wait. Her contest is at the Orange County Convention Center in Orlando? That's fifteen minutes from where I live. And isn't that the same contest that the douchey owner of REIGN is going to be at?

Ordinarily, I don't believe in fate, but this seems meant to be. I'll show Lydia exactly what I'm going to do about REIGN and their exclusionary sizes. Show her my leadership abilities. Instead, I stay and meet the fans. Force a smile. Say the right things. Shelf the thoughts racing through my head.

Kat is practicing her posing, but appears distracted. She frequently looks around like a lost duckling. Usually, Rick is right there in the middle of it all, consulting his iPad, barking out orders, adjusting hair. Tonight, he's nowhere in sight. Neither is Anita. I get an uneasy feeling.

My former teammates' group text starts to light up:

"Where the hell is Rick?"

"No idea. Maybe he was arrested for Megan's murder?"

"But where's Anita?"

"Maybe they're upstairs fucking?"

"They've been fucking for years. Rick would never fuck her before Finals. It would mess up her tan."

"True dat."

"My money's on: Rick's the Fit Girl Killer. Anita's his accomplice."

"This. OMG, this."

Finally, I'm called to the stage for my individual presentation. I numbly step out into the blinding lights, smile plastered to my face, and run through the routine that I've practiced thousands of times. I could do it in my sleep. In fact, it feels like I am.

Once all nine of the finalists have presented (Anita never turned up), we're called back to the stage. We line up on two diagonals. Four stage left, five stage right.

This is the moment of truth. The announcer starts with fifth place. He calls a brunette in an emerald bikini. She brings her hands to her face in excitement. Wipes tears from her eyes. She steps out onto the center line and receives a bouquet of roses. A medal is draped over her head. It briefly gets tangled up in her hair, but she fixes it.

The whole process repeats two more times, until the announcer has fifth, fourth, and third place lined up.

"And now, I'd like to call our top two Bikini Olympians to the stage. One of these ladies will be your 2021 Ms. Bikini Olympia. The other will be your runner-up. May I get a drumroll please?"

### **ASHLEY**

"Ladies and gentlemen, your top two Bikini Olympians are . . . Gemma Jorgenson and Crystal Clancy!"

Around me, the audience erupts. Mechanically, I put my hands together. But unease snakes through my belly. My eyes keep drifting to the Bombshells Only sign that hangs over the stage. Something about it sets off my internal alarm system.

Crystal and Gemma walk out to the center line. They hug each other.

The announcer drops his voice. "Now, ladies and gentlemen. Are you ready?"

The applause is deafening.

I'm on my feet and rushing to the stage.

Crystal covers her mouth and squeezes her eyes shut. Gemma and she hug again. Crystal receives a bouquet and medal.

The announcer continues, "Which means, your 2021 Bikini Olympia winner is Gemma Jorgenson! I'd like to call REIGN owner, Craig Higgins, to the stage to present the check."

I barrel up the stage steps.

Craig limps onto the stage at the same time I get there. "Stop!" I scream. I point to the Bombshells Only sign, which hangs over Gemma and Craig. "There's a bomb in the sign!" Everyone looks up. I charge ahead and knock Gemma and Craig out of the way, like a bowling ball knocking over pins.

A thunderous explosion claps above. My eardrums vibrate. The *O*, now afire, crashes to the stage, inches away, and splinters. More letters start to drop. Screams are all around. Alarms sound. The auditorium Exit signs start to flash.

The announcer declares, "Ladies and gentlemen. Please exit the building."

Gemma appears okay, other than a likely bruised ass. I reach my hand down to her. "Let's get out of here."

## **GEMMA**

Ashley pulls me up. "The nearest exit's backstage," I say.

We dodge falling letters and flaming objects, tottering competitors and trashed roses. One of my heels gets caught in a blond wig. We make our way backstage, where several people clatter toward the exit. Our hands are locked together, tight and sweaty. There's a bottleneck at the door.

I smell something sweet. Like the inside of a confectionary. To my right is a table, set up with champagne flutes and a white cake declaring *Congratulations Bombshells!* in red frosting.

Fat Gemma's laugh rings out in my skull. *Still here*, she says, *and now that we've won the Olympia*, *there's no reason not to treat ourselves*.

How can she still be here? After all this, how? It's like some sort of scary movie. The bitch won't die.

I squeeze Ashley's hand and press forward. Only it's not Ashley's hand anymore. It's much too big. I look down and see hairy knuckles. Follow them up, and there is Craig. Smiling. His whitened teeth gleam.

Then everything goes black.

I've lost her. Around me, people stream toward the exit. Could Gemma already have made her way outside? My gaze sweeps the area, and I spy her traveling away. That REIGN schmuck, Craig, is holding her up by the arm like she's drunk. He opens a door at the far end of the room.

"Hey, what are you doing?" I call and hurry after them.

Craig turns to me and says, "Oh, it's you," like we're friends. "I'm just helping Gemma out of the public eye while she wears this off. Looks like she took too many Xanax. This has become a bit of a problem." He shrugs, like it's no big deal.

"She was fine five minutes ago," I answer tightly. He seems to be favoring his right leg. His right hand is severely bruised. I don't remember these injuries earlier during the protest.
