"Linda, please, dear." She crosses back around the counter and starts fiddling on her computer. "You are the first one to arrive, and I would say that gets you the best room in the house, but truth be told, I already assigned you the best room in the house."

Probably because I'm a half hour early. Wrapping my hands around the giant mug of coffee I snagged from the kitchen earlier this morning, I breathe in its familiar scent. My foot taps under the table, belying the nerves coursing through me. But from the waist up, I'm the picture of cool, calm confidence.

No one would ever know it's been more than a decade since I sat down to participate in an actual table read.

Of course, at my last table read, I fell head over heels into full-on teenage-girl crushdom. Grayson West walked into the room, flashed me a brilliant smile that lit up his aqua-blue eyes, and I completely melted. We flirted relentlessly during the first two weeks of rehearsal, my fifteen-year-old mind already seeing the movie of us as it would play out in the future: flirting would turn to showmance, showmance would turn to committed relationship, committed relationship would lead to engagement and marriage and the two of us running a moviemaking empire while also raising our gorgeous and perfectly behaved children. But comfort is not high on the list of priorities today.

Liz fills a coffee cup from the carafe set up on the large credenza in the corner of the dining room. "You ready for this?"

"No." I let my fake smile slip as I take another long sip of coffee.

She nabs a croissant and takes down half of it in one bite. "Well, you better get ready."

"I see I exhausted my supportive pep talk quota yesterday."

"I know how to get the best out of you, Harper." She flips through the huge binder sitting at the head of the table, not bothering to sit.

"Good morning!" A stunning Korean American woman breezes into the room, striding confidently up to Liz and wrapping her in a hug. "So good to see you again. I'm so excited for this!"

When I see her heading my way next, I push back my chair and stand, holding out my hand. "Hi, I'm—"

"Emmy!" She wraps me in a warm hug. "Thrilled to meet you in person! I'm Jenna. I'm playing your best friend Ashley, and I am a huge fan of your work."

Normally I would assume the compliment is a formality, but Jenna's voice is nothing but sincere. "Thank you so much."

She fills a coffee cup before sliding into the seat next to mine and leaning over to whisper to me. "And seriously, please don't hesitate to let me know if you have any questions during filming. I remember how nervous I was during my first movie shoot. I mean, of course, I'm sure you've been on set plenty—is it unprofessional to say how much I love your parents?—but it can feel different when you're performing."

When the scene changes to one with Grayson and the actor playing his brother, I let out a small sigh of relief. That wasn't so hard. Liz catches my eye and gives me a subtle wink.

"Nailed it," Jenna whispers, nudging my elbow.

I flash her a quick smile before turning my attention back to the script. I'm so dialed in I don't even hear how Grayson's first scene goes. What feels like mere seconds later, the pages flip and it's time for the all-important meet-cute. The first time Grayson and I will interact on-screen.

I deliver my line with perfect inflection.

Grayson delivers his with . . . nothing. Monotonous, completely flat, worse than those apps that try to talk you to sleep, nothing.

My eyes drift across the table, watching him read from the screenplay like it's the phone book. Practically of its own volition, my head turns slightly toward Liz. Not enough to be blatant about it, but enough so I can take in her reaction.

After I'm dressed in a soft turtleneck sweater, designer jeans, heeled booties, and a gorgeous camel coat, and then decorated with gobs of stylish gold jewelry, I make my way into the coffee shop. Liz is consulting with her assistant, Deidre, but she pauses to throw me a smile and a thumbs-up.

The coffee shop is perfect, exactly as I envisioned it while writing. There's a butcher block counter at the front, along with a pastry case full of delicious-looking treats. Even though the shop is closed for business today, the smell of rich coffee and freshly baked cookies permeates the air. The space is small, so there aren't a ton of tables, but a few mismatched pieces

of furniture are scattered throughout the room. If our shooting schedule ever allows for it, I'm certain to come back here for some writing time.

Grayson enters the shop a minute later, dressed in faded jeans and a blue sweater that perfectly matches those stupid eyes. Deidre hands him an apron and walks him over to the counter, pointing out the various props and presumably showing him how to fake make a latte.

Rolling back my shoulders, I continue on with the scene, trying not to let my frustration mount as Grayson takes the dialogue even sharper the further we go in the scene. Isobel and Josh are supposed to complement each other —her brash city girl tempered by his sweet small- town boy. Grayson is destroying the balance with every harsh line he delivers.

But Liz lets us play to the end before calling cut and coming over to join us.

I open my eyes as wide as possible, as if the irritation and ire can seep out of me more easily. Liz just gives me one of her patented shut-the-fuck-up looks and shoos me out of the way. She guides Grayson over to the far corner of the coffee shop, and her body language makes it clear that she is giving him a calm yet stern talking-to.

- 2. While Emmy built a successful career as a screenwriter, she's always had a passion for acting. Is there anything you've been passionate for a long time and wanted to pursue? What would encourage you to go for it?
- 3. Grayson is worried that he will get stuck being typecast into certain sorts of roles. Why does he feel this way? Talk about how his perspective on this shifts, and if you agree or disagree with his concerns.
- 4. In the novel, Liz is both Emmy's coworker and her best friend. Have you ever had to collaborate with a friend on a creative project before? How did it go?
- 5. Talk about Emmy and Grayson's first interaction when they were teenagers. Do you think Emmy was right to react the way she did to Grayson's behavior? How would you have responded?
- 6. If you could star in your own romantic comedy, who would your dream costar be?

- 7. Emmy is the daughter of Hollywood royalty. How does her family background play into her insecurities in the novel? How does it provide a source of strength?
- 8. Did your opinion of Grayson change over the course of the novel? How so?
- 9. Name some of your favorite romantic comedy films. What is it you like about them? Do they have anything in particular in common?
- 10. What do you think is next for Emmy and Grayson?
