What sort of fruit? It was a flippant lie and I felt silly each time I said it. It was clearly meant to be facetious, though why I couldn't figure out. Fu's level of deception made mine look like a child's game.

But without anything concrete, such as my severed head on a platter, the hubbub about me soon died down, replaced by the latest chatter about Lord Song's alleged penchant for lying with his many daughters-in-law. I must admit, I hadn't minded the extra bit of attention.

As the door of opportunity slid shut, my circumstances grew more and more dire. I could no longer concentrate on my tasks in the Imperial Offices. I lost my appetite and stopped sleeping. I spent much of my time stewing in my chambers, complaining to Miaomi. As I starved, the blue palace cat had grown fat from my untouched leftovers, but she was a good

listener as payment and patiently heard me out, as long as I kept rubbing her belly.

What if I hadn't performed to Fu's satisfaction? The memory of that visit was as smoky as the room we were in, but I could recall flashes of fervor, as I had mounted the surprisingly submissive Shi Li in front of the Grand Empress Dowager, who observed us like we were prized horses. The sight of naked Shi Li was both impressive and grotesque, as his otherwise powerfully muscular physique was only marred by his sad castration. I had averted my eyes to avoid looking at the mutilation, though I caught fleeting glances—particularly when he had been on his back.

Then I wondered if I wasn't the only candidate in the running. What if that dastardly Fu was auditioning half the Court? Who else might her eunuch have bent over for? This new suspicion made me fume. Like a boulder up a hill, I rolled the event over and over in my head, obsessing about what I'd said, what I hadn't said, what I'd done, what I hadn't done. Every detail I remembered took its own turn crushing me.

And yes, I did also wonder if instead of being discarded, I had been spared by benevolent fortune... Spared from a life where death might lurk around every palatial corner, where the riches would only be exceeded by treachery. I knew that desiring to be closer to the Emperor was gambling my fate on Heaven's chessboard. Proximity to the Dragon Throne often shortened lifespans. And if an Emperor fell, so, too, would his entire inner circle, even if by their own hands.

But my ambition was deaf to my fears, and I freely obsessed over finding another chance to prove myself. I might have been foolish about many things, but I was not foolish about myself. I knew my gifts were of the physical nature, in my appearance and my sexual talents. My best abilities had been put to the ultimate test, and if I did not pass, I had only myself to blame. I could not bring myself to accept the potentially devastating truth: Could it be possible that I had finally come so close to glory, stroking the edge of the sun, and then...fell short somehow?

Because up until then, I had fallen short my whole life.

Growing up in my hometown of Yunyang, I was like a forgotten valley between two majestic older brothers. They say it is better to be the first son of a humble man than to be the second son of a rich man, and here I was, the tardy and overlooked third.

First Son was a rising politician in our state, painstakingly groomed by our father since birth. Second Son was an enterprising merchant who often sailed to distant lands. And what of me? I once overheard my father grumble that by the time it came to me, he had run out of ink.

As soon as I began to utter words as a child, a hush would fall over the room whenever I attempted to speak. It was clear from an early age that I had a severe stutter. I didn't as much talk as I did expel halting bursts of noise, as though unseen hands were strangling me.

At first, I didn't realize that there was anything so wrong with it, because it was all I had known. But at some point, maybe when I was around six or seven, I realized that whenever I did release my broken speech and my father was present, I would be quickly ushered midsentence out of his sight. Though even that would put it generously, because it was around then that I also realized he never looked directly at me; I was never even within his line of sight.

He spent his every free moment with my two older brothers, who themselves seemed unapproachable and ancient to me as they were a decade older. I knew that I was not the same as them, and I was ashamed.

No one ever did figure out why I had this initial tribulation in my life, and if someone asked my mother, she would have shrugged in relief and said that I simply grew out of it by the time I was a teenager. I suppose to the uninterested bystanders, my stutter seemed to just gradually fade away. No one knew that the moment I could read I essentially stopped sleeping, and began instead a years-long nightly exercise that doubled as contrition.

My family, the Dong Clan, were not literary nor philosophical, and our elders were praised instead for their political shrewdness. We were not from scandalous nor adventurous people, at least not openly. Instead, my father prided himself on his acumen and relative proximity to power. From afar, he seemed to me a gregarious and nimbly witted man, qualities that did not come naturally to me. My early inability to express myself rendered me useless to this stranger.

People whispered about me, whispers that were louder and clearer than I could ever hope to be. Unexplained afflictions in privileged sons like me could predict bad omens for a clan. I found out later that my mother even consulted with sorcerers in hopes to seek a remedy. As for me, I did not wait for magics. I knew that this was my burden to correct on my own, and I was going to stamp it out with sheer determination.

In my childhood home, there was a spare study that no one ever really entered, except whenever it was converted into a bedroom for the occasional unexpected guest. It had an unappealing view, looking out onto the wall of an untended patch of our garden. But this study actually housed a rare artifact of scholarly prominence, which had been a betrothal gift from my mother's clan to my father as part of her dowry.

The gift was a decorative collection of poetry tablets, placed in this spare study and forgotten by my father. Three hundred and five classic odes were etched onto these many tablets, some of them dating back more than a thousand years, anthologized by Confucius himself.

As soon as I was skilled enough in reading, I would go to this little study each night, and I would read these ancient poems aloud to myself. I would read until I stammered on a character, and then I would repeat that word until I said it correctly, then start the ode over again. I repeated this simple process for nearly four years. I read and reread these tablets so many times that to this day I still have their poems all memorized in the correct order.

That is how I lost my stutter: not by magics but by methodical labor. But it wasn't all gloom. Despite the mental strain of the exercise, the poems themselves were often dreamy and romantic, the amorous verses of separated lovers bemoaning the distance between them.

Those who know me
Say I have a sad heart,
Those who do not know me,
Say I am missing something.
O endlessly blue Heaven:
Who is this missing person?

Raised by the yearning splendor of these old love songs, I was only further motivated to expel my shortcomings and find a way for myself into the world beyond my small province. Maybe, I thought, if I defeat my impediment I, too, can create a life that is epic enough to be immortalized as great poetry.

After four years of reciting these poems, my stutter left me without a trace. But I never told anyone about those long years of my poetic immolation. It felt better to pretend I just outgrew it, because...it was a lot

of effort for something that shouldn't have been wrong in the first place. Better to just not call attention to it, I figured.

The cruel irony is that in all that time I spent practicing how to speak to him properly, my father had spent it forgetting I ever existed. By the age the hair began to grow on my face, he had risen in prominence in the Emperor's court and spent most of his time there. I was not a priority on his returns home, where he spent his time conjugating with his cronies, hosting diplomatic banquets and visiting my mother's chambers. The closest interaction we ever had was when I refilled his cup at dinner. Once in a while I'd get a pat on the shoulder as I helped him mount his horse to return to the Endless Palace, but not much else.

The Endless Palace! Each time I watched my father and his caravan disappear over the horizon, I would think of this faraway Palace and long to be there as well. But without the favor of my father, I had a better chance of growing wings and flying there. Without his endorsement, I was not meant for greatness.

I promised myself that if the door of opportunity presented itself again, I would be like a battering ram.

When I was seventeen, that door appeared. My father sent word to us that he would be accompanied by a guest of the utmost honor who would be staying at our home for one night. Our entire household began to plan for the arrival of the Prefect Grand Astrologer, adviser to the Emperor on metaphysical affairs of state.

But even more intriguing was his other duty, which my mother pointedly mentioned to me when we first received the news: The Astrologer was the proctor of an infamously difficult examination. Any man, privileged or common, who hoped to serve in the Endless Palace, could ask to take this test. A perfect score guaranteed entry to the Court as a clerk. And this test was a literacy test!

Heaven was finally heeding me. I had spent the end of my childhood locked in a library memorizing classic poetry for this very reason. If I could not win my father's favor, I would enter the Endless Palace by my own merits, and all the more better so. I furiously practiced my calligraphy for the next weeks. By the time I heard the shouts from our servants announcing my father's return, my hands were knotted with calluses.

That evening I nervously followed my mother into our banquet hall, readying myself to meet the man who might change the trajectory of my

life. My plan was to take advantage of my proximity to the Prefect Grand Astrologer at dinner and petition him to let me take the test. I knew my father would likely be angry, but if I managed to charm the Astrologer, perhaps they would humor me.

But upon entering the hall, I was aghast to see that my two elder brothers had traveled home unannounced to surprise my father and our guest of honor. I watched from my mother's side as the visitor lauded praise over my father's accomplished sons. I was exiled to a table with young cousins far away from them.

The only acknowledgment I received was much later in the evening, when my father, red with mirth and drink, summoned me over to refill his cup.
